Greg Walton and I have been working together throughout the year enhancing the skills and knowledge of our staff in behavior management and de-escalation. One of the ways we are doing this is by increasing the number of certified Crisis Prevention Institute (CPI) trainers from one to three. This offers us increased flexibility in delivering formal training to staff members whose positions require certification in verbal and physical intervention techniques. In addition, our trainers have presented to the faculty at each school offering foundational knowledge in escalation and tools, the goal of which is to equip all educators with strategies that they can apply regularly to support all students.

### **FY24 French River Oil Bid Results**

Auburn once again participated in the French River Collaborative Bid for Oil for the upcoming 2023-2024 School Year, with the assistance of Competitive Energy. There were two companies, namely, Peterson Oil and Dennis K. Burke, responding to the Bid, which was opened on February 15, 2023. After discussion amongst group members present, it was unanimously decided to move forward as a group with the ULSHO as opposed to the ULSHO 10 oil and award it to Dennis K. Burke, who was the lowest and most responsive bidder for a price of \$3.0442 per gallon. Each District will need to accept the bid and sign a contract with Dennis K. Burke to provide oil for the one year period, July 1, 2023 through June 30, 2024.

### **Residency Check Points**

Dr. Chamberland: We continue to have situations brought to our attention where we discover students who are enrolled in our district who do not live in Auburn. When this is discovered, we work diligently to either update and confirm Auburn residency with the family, or have the students withdrawn from the district. In an effort to mitigate these occurrences, I am recommending that as students transition from one school building to the next, we ask for updated residency paperwork from the family. We are currently exploring the most convenient and secure options for families to use for this process through Powerschool. We will use the returning student form, and proof of residency can be uploaded. Building secretaries will be responsible to follow up with families. We hope to start this in the Spring.

### SWCEC at a glance

Contained in this document is the SWCEC 2<sup>nd</sup> Quarter Progress Report for Fiscal Year 2023. This report spans from October 1 through December 31, 2022. In this report you will find details from each of our programs, our related services, and fiscal information regarding the current status of SWCEC. The second quarter of every fiscal year is a busy time for our students and faculty, as there is a lot of work being done to ready our students for yearly MCAS assessments in the winter and springtime. Aside from the hard academic work that our students engage in, we manage to find ways to enjoy the different holidays and have fun while making great progress academically, emotionally, and socially.

Our Developmental Program has enjoyed the benefit of a program initially started at Grow Elementary School called SPOT, which is a combination of co-treatment and therapies of speech and language and occupational therapy. Much thanks to Mary Sanderson, SLP and Carol Corriveau, COTA for putting the time and effort into developing this great program for all our students. The Developmental Program also enjoyed a new music therapist, Kayla Daly, who brings great joy and harmony (pun intended) to the regularly scheduled music sessions on Thursdays. Our Developmental Program has also benefitted from increased interactions and engagement with our elementary and middle/high school programs.

Grow Elementary School (GES) hosted a Cocoa with Cops meet and greet with Southbridge School Resource Officer Dottin in December where he and students played games, talked about their interests and hobbies to promote positive interactions and a sense of community outreach between SWCEC and the Southbridge Police Department. GES also started a Health Curriculum that focuses on wellness, hygiene, and sexual education in December that is being provided to the sixth grade students. Finally, our document here demonstrates growth that our students are achieving in literacy and math as a result of our three-times-per year STAR testing.

The Grow Middle/High School (GMHS) and Career Development Program (GCDP) were in full swing to put together yet another successful students versus faculty football game leading up to the Thanksgiving Break. Our elementary students and developmental program students came to cheer on the participants even though it was a chilly and blustery day in November for this annual event. The GCDP students have been engaging in a variety of community service opportunities as well as college and career readiness information sessions during the second quarter.

In other news, we had a very successful first round of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion training workshop on October 7<sup>th</sup> with Keesha LaTulippe. This training was so well received that staff indicated a strong desire to continue this critical work during our next full day PD session in January 2023.

### Developmental Program - Medically Fragile

Students in SWCEC's Medically Fragile program had a very busy quarter. They continued to make progress toward meeting their IEP objectives through a trans-disciplinary, multi-modal approach to teaching and learning. Curriculum units were carried over into related services including speech and language therapy, and occupational therapy. These therapists were also observed in the classroom co-treating during teacher led learning opportunities. The classroom curriculum featured activities based on themes across the quarter including Pumpkins, Turkeys, and Snow Forms. Each of these month-long units had read alouds from the teacher and picture walks for the students. Anchor charts with picture vocabulary supported the student's comprehension of the lesson as well as related arts and crafts on each topic area.

Students in the medically fragile program also participated in a SPOT group once per week this quarter. This is a speech and occupational therapist led group that offered theme based multi-sensory, hands on, language rich activities. The SPOT group was first formed at the Grow Elementary School, and it had so much success there that these GES based therapists took their "show" on the road to Building # 3. The students have responded favorably, and SPOT has been on every Thursday occurrence through the fall.

The Developmental Program has benefitted greatly from a new Music Therapist, Kayla Daly. Kayla is the Owner/Clinical Director of the Worcester Center for Expressive Therapies. Her musical talents are incredibly impressive. She understands our Developmental Program students' learning profiles and as such has made an immediate connection with all of them. Kayla is another asset to the Program and both students and staff look forward to her 45-minute sessions in each classroom every Thursday.

### Developmental Program - Autism

Students in SWCEC's Specialized Autism program ended the month of October with a Halloween party highlighted with spooky music and a sensory table where students were able to feel different tactile objects and use their imaginations to try and guess what the items were. The literature focus for the month of October for the Students in the Specialized Autism program were The World of Humphrey book series, which was a big hit and The Lightning Thief. Students showed their understanding of the stories by answering daily listening comprehension questions in the form of True/False, Yes/No questions given pictures cues.

The November highlight was of course the annual Grow Student/Staff Football Game and Thanksgiving Feast. The Developmental Program students cheered on their peers and staff at the football game with full bellies. The November Science, Geography curriculum units were enriched with News 2 You articles on topics such as Echo Robot, The National Dog Show, The Museum of Broadway, and the 2022 World Cup. Chapter book studies throughout November included *Bunnicula*, and *Howliday Inn*.

December was highlighted again with a holiday school dance, music, lights, and snacks with peers from the Grow Middle/High School. The last day of school before the Winter break featured a pajama party and a visit from Santa. Literature circles leading up to the Winter break and the New Year included Remembering 2022, Winter Paralympics, The Queens Jubilee, and Nicole Mann, the First Native American Woman to go to Space, National Western Stock Show, Disney Animation-Immersive Experience, the Kiruna (Sweden) Snow Festival, and the Amsterdam Light Festival. Through the Unique Learning Systems curriculum, students learned about recycling and

about different traditions people have for celebrating the holidays. Using what they learned from this Social Studies lesson, students created their own unique holiday ornaments to give to their families.

The Developmental Program and the Grow Middle/High School are creating more opportunities for including one another in their respective learning environments. On a regular basis you can find Grow students in the Developmental Program, playing music, singing songs, reading books, or being lunch buddies together. Alternatively, the Developmental Program students are welcomed on every occasion to the Grow School to celebrate a holiday party, or a special dance or get together, or to cash in earnings at the Grow School store.

### Enrollment as of 12/31/2022 - 4

### **Grow Elementary School**

The elementary school students hosted a Cocoa with Cops event in December. Two Southbridge police officers visited the school for cocoa and cookies. The officers read stories to the students.

Health was added to the  $6^{th}$  grade curriculum in December. The curriculum focuses on health, wellness, hygiene, and sexual education. SWCEC enlisted a teacher from You, INC to provide the education to our  $6^{th}$  grade students. The class meets once per week for 6-7 weeks.

STAR testing is used to access students three times per year in literacy and math. All the classrooms showed overall student growth from the fall testing window into the winter testing window. Students in grade 1 and grade 2 had an overall growth in literacy of 53% and 60.5% in math. On the grade 3 and grade 4 classrooms reported similar growth from September to December. These students demonstrated 43% growth in math and 49% growth in literacy.

### **Grow Middle High School**

The Grow Middle High School continues to provide high quality differentiated instruction, to a wide range of students grouped by educational levels as well as social emotional focus. Counselors work with students in the moment teaching DBT skills, mindfulness and alternatives to behavior in order to provide them with the opportunity to be successful in their education. Grow teachers and staff meet daily before students arrive and discuss individual student's needs, behaviors and academics, making sure everyone has the information needed to effectively service each student and ensure success to the best of their ability. The necessity of tier two and tier three interventions are discussed and developed during these meetings.

There have been a few writing contests that have occurred in both the middle and high school. Eleven middle school students were selected to have their stories published in a young writer's book called Twisted Tales.

There continues to be a focus on diversity in each of our subjects, carefully looking into our clubs, groups and monthly school wide PBIS activities including; Halloween Howler, Thanksgiving celebration, Winter Dance, Food contests and winter celebrations around the world door contest.

There is an initiative this year to integrate Middle High School students with Developmental students, reward elementary students to spend time with Middle High School staff, and mentoring students with students.

### Career Development Program

The GCDP students participated in community service and work experience at The Sturbridge Host Hotel, Nichols College, Meals on Wheels and The Oxford Congregational Church.

Throughout October and November the students toured and participated in informational sessions at Quinsigamond Community College and The Learning Center (Oxford, MA), where they were introduced to Welding HVAC and steam boiler trades.

The long standing tradition of SWCEC Thanksgiving Dinner took place with the GCDP students doing the grocery shopping, preparing some of the sides, clean up and serving both Grow & Developmental students and staff. The school store was up and running with holiday gift options available for purchase including holiday signs made by students using the cricut machine.

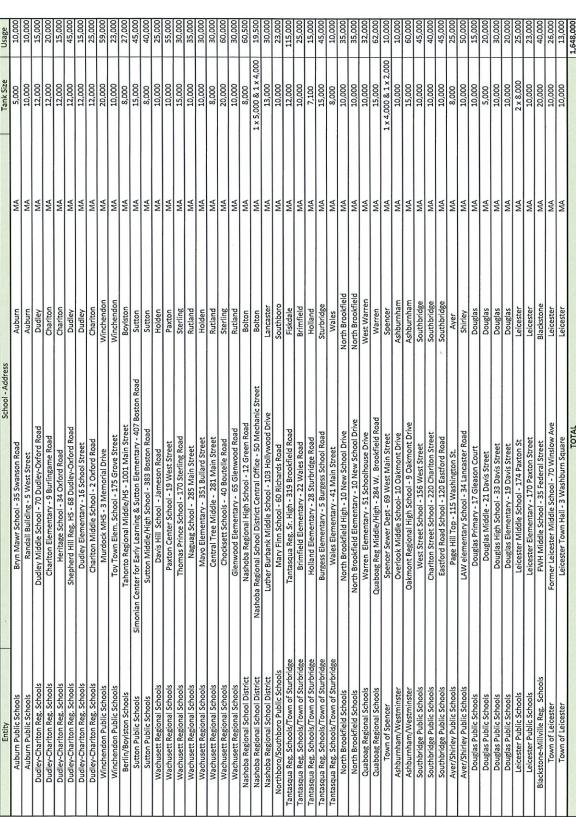

As noted, Medicaid funds are reimbursed after the fact for services rendered; such services are provided by the Auburn Public Schools in support of Medicaid-eligible students. The monies go into the General Fund and then, with approval of Town Meeting, are used by the School Department. Since these funds are in reimbursement of services already provided, we respectfully request your approval of this Article.
Article To see if the Town Meeting will vote to appropriate \$, which is the interest earned by the Auburn High School Gymnasium Health and Recreational Trust Fund to offset School Department costs at Auburn High School in support of community health and recreational activities at Auburn High School gymnasium and related facilities and equipment; or act on anything relative thereto.  By the Auburn School Committee
With Town Meeting's approval, these funds will be used to offset the necessary costs at Auburn High School in support of the community's use of the Auburn High Gymnasium, therefore we respectfully request your approval of this Article.
Article To see if the Town Meeting will vote to appropriate \$, from McKinney-Vento Receipts within the General Fund Revenues to the Auburn School Department Operating Budget for Fiscal Year 2024 to fund transportation for students to and from school who have become homeless during the Fiscal Year, or act on anything relative thereto.  By the Auburn School Committee
The district spends funds each year transporting homeless students, either to their home district (we share in the cost with the receiving District, 50%-50%) or paying half the cost to another district to transport a student who had previously attended an Auburn School prior to becoming homeless and moving into temporary housing out of Town, to the Auburn Schools. Since these funds are in reimbursement for transportation already provided, we respectfully request your approval of this Article.
Article To see if the Town Meeting will vote to appropriate \$

To support educational stability for children who are placed in foster care, the 2015 Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) requires the children in foster care remain in their school of origin, unless it is determined not to be in the child's best interest to remain in that school. The law also requires the children in foster care be provided transportation to their school of origin. At the Town Meeting in May of 2020, it was approved for the Superintendent to sign a Memorandum of Understanding with the Department of Children and Families, the Executive Office of Health, and Human services and the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education in order to obtain Federal Title IV-E reimbursement. Auburn Public Schools by meeting the requirements can expect to receive a percentage of the transportation costs incurred in the prior year. Since these funds are in reimbursement for transportation already provided, we respectfully request your approval of this Article.
